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

THE COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER



Ike Muslow, M.D.

Vice Chancellor Dr. Ike Muslow is a distinguished member of the LSU Medical Center family. His association began when he graduated from LSU School of Medicine in New Orleans in 1948. Since then, his achievement and contributions to LSU Medical Center and to the medical community at large have been immense and far-reaching.

As a faculty member in the Department of Medicine, Dr. Muslow directed one of only two Kidney Stations in the south, at Charity Hospital. He also directed the first fellowship program in dialysis in the State of Louisiana. He served as the Administrative Director—Department of Internal Medicine, of Confederate Memorial Medical Center from 1964-1970, achieving the first full complement of residents in Internal Medicine.

Dr. Muslow began the first chronic dialysis unit in Shreveport at Willis-Knighton in 1970. He developed, with Board of Family Medicine approval, a residency program in Family Medicine for which he wrote and was awarded a \$1,125,000 grant.

Dr. Muslow was appointed Medical Director of Confederate Memorial Medical Center in 1974 and Dean, LSU School of Medicine, Shreveport, in 1975. He assumed full responsibility of CMMC when it was designated the University Hospital in 1976. Under his leadership, the University Hospital underwent expansion and extensive improvements. He was the first Dean to represent the University on the Committee of 100.

Dr. Muslow was appointed Vice Chancellor for Shreveport Affairs in 1981, a post he continues to hold today. His numerous accomplishments have been lauded many times during his long and respected career. But one particular honor, the Shreveport Medical Society's Distinguished Service Award for "Outstanding Contribution to Medicine", is singularly significant for it cited Dr. Muslow for his "dedication to medical students as well as the medical community", recognizing the tremendous impact this man has had on the lives of so many.

ACADEMIC HERALDRY: THE SYMBOLS OF LEARNING

The college or university commencement procession today, in this Nation and abroad, is a pageant, alive and bright with dress and ceremony inherited from the medieval European universities of the eleventh and twelfth centuries.

To preserve their dignity and meaning it early became necessary for those universities to set rules for academic dress. American universities agreed on a definite system in 1895 and set up a suitable code of academic dress for the colleges and universities of the United States. In 1932 The American Council on Education presented a revised code which, for the most part, governs the style of academic dress today.

The Principle features of academic dress are three: The gown, the cap, and the hood.

The Gown. The flowing gown comes from the twelfth century. It has become symbolic of the democracy of scholarship, for it completely covers any dress of rank or social standing beneath. It is gray for the associate degree, and black for all other degrees, with pointed sleeves for the Associate and Bachelor's degree; long, closed, sleeves for the Master's degree, with a slit for the arm; and round, open sleeves for the Doctor's degree. The gown worn for Associate, Bachelor's or Master's degree has no trimmings. The gown for the Doctor's degree is faced down the front with velvet and has three bars of velvet across the sleeves, in the color distinctive of the faculty or discipline to which the degree pertains. For certain institutions the official colors of the college or university may appear on the gown or its decorations.

The Cap. The freed slave in Ancient Rome won the privilege of wearing a cap, and so the academic cap is a sign of the freedom of scholarship and the responsibility and dignity with which scholarship endows the wearer. Old poetry records the cap of scholarship as a square to symbolize the book, although some authorities claim that the mortar board is a symbol of the masons, a privileged guild. The color of the tassel on the cap denotes the discipline, although a gold tassel may be worn with any Doctor's gown.

The Hood. Heraldically, the hood is an inverted shield with one or more chevrons of a secondary color on the ground of the primary color of the college or university. The color of the face of the hood denotes the discipline represented by the degree; the color of the lining of the hood designates the university or college from which the degree was granted.
